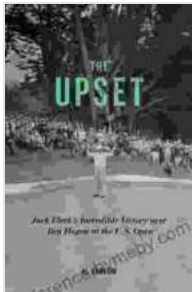


Jack Fleck's Incredible Victory Over Ben Hogan at the Open

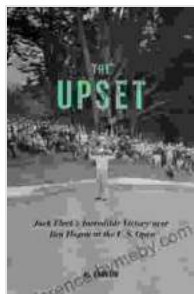
